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The 2023 Annual Meeting of the Bermuda Drug Information Network (BerDIN) was held on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of November, 2023 at the Bermuda Underwater Exploration Institute (BUEI).

# **CALL TO ORDER & WELCOME**

<u>Renee Lightbourne</u>, a BerDIN Member who represented the Department of Court Services, called the meeting to order and extended a welcome to the meeting's participants and invited guests.

Housekeeping matters were also conveyed.

# **OPENING REMARKS**

Anthony Santucci, Executive Director of CADA, brought Opening Remarks to the meeting. He noted that this year marks the 13<sup>th</sup> publication produced by BerDIN and that the BerDIN has evolved into a central source of drug-related information that serves a critical role in informing policy makers and the public about the drug situation in Bermuda. Mr. Santucci shared that this year's meeting, will focus on updating the membership on recent activities and initiatives from both demand and supply reduction agencies. He highlighted the fact that participants have all been faced with challenges that have hindered their ability to collect, input and manage drug-related information. Mr. Santucci ended his opening remarks by stating, "it is only through our collective efforts can we reduce the impact of substance misuse on our society."

Following the Opening Remarks, the meeting was officially declared open by Executive Director, Anthony Santucci.

# INTRODUCTION

Participants were reminded of the meeting's objectives by <u>Mr. Duncan Barclay</u>, Results, Compliance and Investigations Manager, Bermuda Sports Anti-Doping Authority; who also informed the participants of the meeting's objectives: to update the BerDIN members on the current drug situation; and to provide a forum for dialogue on drug-related special interest topics.

In the interest of keeping the agenda items as scheduled, participants were then asked to briefly introduce themselves (name and department he/she represented) for the benefit of all persons present in the meeting room.

# **Procedural Matters**

The meeting determined its hours of work.

# **Adoption of Agenda**

The Agenda, as adopted by the meeting, is in **Annex II** to this Report.

# PRESENTATIONS

The main focus, of the Annual meeting this year, was on updating the membership on recent activities and initiatives from both demand and supply reduction agencies. The agenda therefore, was comprised of various presentations that discussed those updates. Each presenter continued to highlight the increased challenges around data collection and being able to produce the data points required for BerDIN, but noted that there is a continued effort to improve this issue.

# **Adolescent Substance Treatment**

The meeting received a presentation, from <u>Mr. Leslie Grant</u>, discussing the adolescent substance treatment programme that is administered by FOCUS. He outlined the history of the programme, how it currently functions, a breakdown of the clients being seen, and the substance issues that the clients were presenting with. Mr. Grant closed his presentation with a discussion around the activities the clients participate in during the programme, whilst highlighting the emphasis placed on treatment of cannabis/marijuana.

# Update on the Drug Situation in Bermuda

The meeting then received a presentation from <u>Dr. Kyla Raynor</u>, BerDIN Coordinator and Senior Research Officer/Policy Analyst of the DNDC, on the current drug situation in Bermuda. Dr. Raynor provided a snapshot of Bermuda's drug situation as presented within the 2023 Annual Report of the BerDIN. The BerDIN's accomplishments were highlighted as the members were thanked for their continual support. Highlights were given in relation to the data that was reported throughout the eleven chapters of the Report. Dr. Raynor also discussed the large number of data gaps in this year's report along with the issue of data validity that arose during the analysis phase. She concluded by challenging the members to continue their important work despite the current challenges we are facing.

#### The Network:

**Commended** for its comprehensive representation and great work to-date.

<u>Urged</u> to provide any additional data that can strengthen the Network's coverage, especially qualitative data.

<u>Encouraged</u> to have more bilateral or group meetings to facilitate further dialogue and problem resolution.

# **DNDC Survey Initiatives 2023**

The Department for National Drug Control (DNDC) representative, <u>Mrs. Stephanie Tankard</u>, Research Officer, provided the meeting with an update on the Department's survey initiatives since the last meeting. She spoke about eight surveys: public amenity, treatment demand, consumer experience, employee experience, stakeholder feedback, AUDIT, and the National School Survey (NSS). The purpose and methodology of the NSS were presented in detail along with pertinent survey highlights.

# National Drug Strategy

<u>Mrs. Joanne Dean</u>, Director of the Department for National Drug Control (DNDC) gave the meeting an update with regards to the National Drug Control Master Plan 2019-2024 by highlighting the findings on what has been accomplished and a way forward.

It was noted, that the Master Plan is structurally sound with 16 goals supported by 51 objectives. The Director stated that, according to the budget for supply and demand reduction, it always comes up short but demand does better then supply with regards to realizing anticipated need.

Majority of the presentation highlighted the number of challenges being faced for drug control management, demand and supply reduction, whilst detailing the data gaps for policy and legislation. In terms of accomplished objectives, Research & Policy ranked the highest (65%), followed by HM Customs (63%), whilst Police and Prevention have accomplished 50% of their set objectives.

Moving forward, Mrs. Dean shared the three steps that DNDC will aim to work through from 2025-2027.

# Substance Use and Road Traffic Accidents


<u>Mrs. Shirley Place</u> who is the Clinical Director of Turning Point, informed the meeting that the Bermuda Hospitals Board and the DNDC have begun a collaboration, in May 2023, to assess substance use and road traffic accidents. Mrs. Place shared the background/purpose of the survey along with the respective stakeholders involved. Majority of the presentation focused on the types of data points collected as well as a breakdown of what the collected data looked like thus far. Lastly, Mrs. Place discussed next steps and the way forward for the survey.

# **Drug Interdiction**

The BerDIN members were provided with a presentation lead by <u>Detective Inspector Nidol</u> <u>Barker</u>, Bermuda Police Service Crime Division, as well as Detective Constable Damon Hollis. The presentation focused on the issues surrounding local drug interdiction and emerging trends/ risks. Participants were informed of the following areas: purpose of drug interdiction, issues with staffing, training and equipment, concealment methods, interdepartmental collaboration and dangerous and identical drugs. There was an informative discussion preceding the presentation where participants shared their experiences with drug interdiction.

Noted the information provided in the presentation.

# Government Lab Update

There was an impromptu presentation from <u>Ms. Rentha Francis</u>, of the Government Lab, who spoke about the new things being observed at the time of chemical analysis of substances. The members were informed of the increased number of substances being mixed with fentanyl as well as the alarmingly large number of drug seizures this year, especially amongst youth 12-18 years, in comparison to what was reported in 2022.

#### **Special Presentation – Uplift**

The day ended with an informative presentation from <u>Kalyn and Michelle Cannonier</u>, of Uplift. As a bespoke hemp business, the presenters shared that their goal is to raise awareness about common misconceptions that the pubic have on hemp and cannabis plants. A breakdown of their products was given, a discussion on why Uplift encourages micro-dosing was shared, whilst common myths around the business of Uplift were discussed and explained to the members.

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
