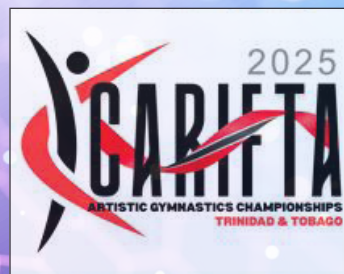

The next phase of the course was the technical learning for one week followed by coaching and shadowing at the centre. ## Bermuda Amateur Swimming Association

Bermuda swimmers continued with their busy schedule of meets and intensive training during December and early January.

The Warwick Swim Team attended the annual NC QCD Holiday Invite December 12-15th. The team was very successful in achieving a multitude of personal best times as well as several Podium places. Logan Jones led the way with four top three finishes.

Connor Hupman qualified for the US Speedo Winter Junior Championships which took place from December 10th- 14th. Connor swam in three individual events, posting personal best times in all three events in this highly competitive junior competition.

BASA held the first of two long course qualifying meets on December 20th at NSC, and was pleased to have many of our overseas swimmers participate in this event. Nayland Harris was able to add his name to the growing list of swimmers to meet the Carifta qualifying standard.

Jack and Emma Harvey made a return to long course competition in December at the 2025 Toyota US Open Championships, Austin Texas. In a highly competitive field loaded with Olympic medallists, the siblings progressed to several finals and secured Commonwealth Games qualifying times. Jack hit the standard in both of his backstroke events while sister Emma achieved the standard in all five of her events. As an extra bonus Emma set a new National Record in the 50m freestyle with a time of 25.69.

Returning to Austin in early January in the first of the USA Swimming Pro Swim Series events, Emma broke the first National Record of 2026, beating her own record in the 50m butterfly with a time of 26.59. In addition to progressing to five A finals she was able to secure a sixth Commonwealth Games qualification standard.

In January, Basa will host a second long course qualifying times as well as a short course event at the end of January. Swimmers will have until February 22nd to qualify for Carifta. College and overseas school swimmers continue their in season meets before gearing up for Championship Meets in February.

## Bermuda Bicycle Association

### Bermuda cyclists rack up medals and 2026 qualification spots

In October 2025, Bermuda's cyclists delivered a landmark performance at the Caribbean Cycling Championships in Belize, earning four medals, securing Central American and Caribbean (CAC) Games qualification, and strengthening the island's international standing in elite road cycling.

Nicholas Narraway led the charge with a dominant victory in the elite men's individual time trial, beating teammate Conor White into second place. The result marked Narraway's first elite Caribbean title and capped a standout season in which he was also crowned Bermuda National Elite Time Trial Champion, confirming his progression into the top tier of regional competition.

In his first-year racing beyond under-23 ranks, Narraway was the only rider to complete the 32.5km course in under 40 minutes, stopping the clock at 39:25 (53.58km/h). His victory delivered a direct qualification place for Bermuda at the 2026 Central American and Caribbean (CAC) Games, providing a clear and measurable benefit to the national sporting programme.

The elite women's events proved equally successful for Gabriella Arnold, who earned bronze in the time trial and followed it with a silver medal in the road race. Arnold played a decisive role in shaping the road race outcome, initiating the final split in the women's field before consolidating her effort to shed all but one competitor. Both podium finishes also secured CAC Games qualification spots for Bermuda, reinforcing the nation's continued competitiveness in women's elite cycling.

Beyond the medals, Bermuda's men's contingent, Narraway, White and Kaden Hopkins, accumulated valuable UCI points across national and regional competition. When combined with additional points earned by other Bermudian riders at the Bermuda National Championships, the results elevated Bermuda to 50th in the UCI nation rankings at a critical qualification window, earning the country one start place on the start list for the 2026 UCI Road World Championships in Montreal. A huge accomplishment for a small nation in the cycling world.

With momentum building, the Bermuda Bicycle Association is now preparing to support its Junior, U23 and Elite cyclists across a strong international programme in 2026, with targeted participation at major championships including the Junior and Elite Caribbean Road and MTB Championships, Central American and Caribbean Games, Pan American Championships both Road and Track, a Commonwealth Games, and the UCI Road World Championships, ensuring continued athlete development and international representation for Bermuda.

From the opening frames to the final tally, the night was packed with momentum swings, clutch shots, and big handicap drama that kept everyone locked in.

When the dust settled, Matthew Viney and David Maycock stood alone at the summit, capturing first place with a commanding 1431 handicap series. Their performance was a model of consistency and composure, highlighted by a standout 475 high game and a strong 1359 scratch total that proved impossible to catch once the handicap was applied. Hot on their heels were Quinton Hayward and Elvin Thomas, whose steady scoring kept them in contention all night. They finished second with 1419, showing impressive balance across all three games. Not far behind, Quinn Simmons and Jamel Bean put together one of the night's most exciting runs, posting a massive 504 handicap game on their way to third place with 1393.

The middle of the leaderboard was stacked, with just a handful of pins separating several teams. Carl Reid and Rickai Binns, Deshi Smith and Donald Foley, and Vanessa Daley and Janeen Daley all delivered big games and strong series, proving that every frame mattered. Handicap swings added extra intrigue, as teams surged and slipped with every spare and strike.

From explosive single-game performances to gritty three-game series, the 2026 Bermuda USBC Doubles Tournament showcased everything great about doubles bowling—teamwork, strategy, and the thrill of competing right down to the final pin.

Her selection underscores her ongoing development and growing impact within West Indies women's cricket.

### Historic Triumph in the CWI T20 Blaze

### From Grassroots to Global: Evan Heyliger Appointed ITF Development Officer

The Bermuda Lawn Tennis Association is pleased to announce another first for Bermuda tennis.

The International Tennis Federation (ITF) has officially ushered in a new chapter for Caribbean tennis with the appointment of Bermudian Evan Heyliger as the Development Officer for the Confederation of Tennis of Central America and the Caribbean Region (COTECC). Taking the baton from John Goede, Heyliger steps into a pivotal role aimed at modernizing the sport across a vast and diverse jurisdiction.

Evan Heyliger's appointment as the ITF Development Officer for the Caribbean is a historic milestone that resonates deeply with the pride of Bermuda tennis. At just 26 years old, Heyliger, a former junior standout and Level 2 certified coach, has transitioned from the local courts of the Bermuda Lawn Tennis Association (BLTA) to a prestigious global leadership role, overseeing tennis development across 20 nations. This appointment is a powerful validation of Bermuda's tennis ecosystem, proving that the island can produce not only world-class athletes but also elite administrators capable of shaping the sport's future. For Bermuda, seeing "one of their own" take over a position held

by the highly respected John Goede since 2015 serves as a massive inspiration for the next generation, signaling that there are no limits to where a career in Bermudian tennis can lead.

### Key Aspects of the Role

The position is a "boots on the ground" role vital to the International Tennis Federation's global strategy. Heyliger will be responsible for:

- **Coaches Education:** Conducting Level 1 and Level 2 courses to certify regional coaches.
- **Grassroots Growth:** Establishing the ITF Junior Tennis Initiative to bring new players into the game.
- **Facility Oversight:** Helping nations recognize and upgrade their training centers.
- **Elite Pathways:** Ensuring promising players have the administrative and performance support needed to pursue professional careers.

### A Strategic Vision for Regional Growth

Heyliger isn't just maintaining the status quo; he is launching a renewed effort to create a more cohesive talent pipeline across the islands. His primary objectives center on professionalizing the sport from the ground up:

- **Grassroots Expansion:** Boosting youth participation by integrating tennis into school-based programs through the Junior Tennis Initiative.
- **Technical Excellence:** Standardizing coaching certifications to ensure local instructors are equipped with the latest ITF methodologies and high-performance training techniques.
- **Infrastructure & Logistics:** Supporting national associations with facility upgrades and court maintenance to position the Caribbean as a premier hub for international events.

### The Caribbean Remit: 23 Territories United

The scale of this appointment is reflected in the 23 nations and territories that fall under Heyliger's development umbrella. Over the coming months, he will conduct site visits to assess the specific needs of:

Anguilla, Antigua & Barbuda, Aruba, Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, Bonaire, British Virgin Islands, Cayman Islands, Curaçao, Dominica, French Guiana, Grenada, Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, St. Kitts & Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent & the Grenadines, Suriname, Trinidad & Tobago, Turks & Caicos, U.S. Virgin Islands

### Proven Leadership on the Court

Heyliger brings a multidisciplinary edge to the position. As an experienced coach and administrator with the Bermuda Lawn Tennis Association, he holds certifications in both tennis instruction and strength and conditioning.

The ITF leadership has cited his deep familiarity with the region's unique geographical and logistical challenges as a key asset. By understanding the nuances of the Caribbean landscape, Heyliger is expected to foster stronger collaboration between national associations, ensuring that talent in smaller territories receives the same level of support as those in larger nations.

### The Road Ahead

With the 2026 calendar year now officially underway, the focus will be on site visits to provide crucial information, tailoring development plans to the unique cultural and economic landscapes of each member nation. Under his guidance, the ITF is doubling down on a future where Caribbean tennis is synonymous with consistency, professionalism, and international success.

### International Representation

#### Hosting the 2026 Caribbean Championships

Bermuda's pickleball community is counting down to hosting the Caribbean Championships on home soil from March 17-21, a milestone that firmly positions the island as a rising regional hub for the sport. These events will bring together many of the same Caribbean nations that battled in Grand Cayman in 2025, where Bermuda collected an impressive 12 medals across Open, Senior, and Junior divisions and helped with event organization, showcasing both playing strength and technical expertise. Bermuda is poised to deliver a memorable championship experience while giving local fans the chance to watch our national team compete at the highest level on home courts.

For players, the Championships will provide invaluable match play against regional opposition building on the success of last year's Elite team gold medal run in the 2025 Caribbean Championships in Cayman Islands and the Senior team's bronze medal winning

performance. Beyond the courts, these events align with the PAB's strategy to elevate competition, expand tourism partnerships, and showcase Bermuda as an attractive destination for visiting players and their families.

#### Gold Medal – Marco Island Police Foundation Pickleball Slammer in Florida

At the Marco Island Police Foundation Pickleball Slammer in Florida, PAB members Leslie Jackson and Maclean Smith delivered a standout performance, capturing the gold medal in the Women's Doubles 3.0–3.99 skill division on January 24–25, 2026. Facing a strong eight team field, they won their semifinal convincingly 11–3 before closing out the final 11–3, finishing the medal round unbeaten and securing top spot ahead of teams from Virginia, Connecticut, New York, Ohio, and Florida.

This result adds an important international title to Bermuda's growing list of overseas achievements and reflects the depth of our women's program at the 3.0–3.99 level.

### ILCA Oceana & Australian Open and Youth Championships, Hobart, Australia.

Campbell Patton raced his ILCA 7 Laser dinghy to 11th. place overall in the 40 boats fleet, following 6 days of competition. Campbell faced “short, sharp waves” and strong tidal currents and yet managed to finish in the top 10 in most of his races. His best was a 2nd. place in race 5. Campbell is building towards his International World Cup plans having recently won the New South Wales & ACT State Championships



### December's Orange Bowl International Youth Regatta, Miami.

It took until day 3 of the event before the winds filled in sufficiently for racing to begin.

In the ILCA 6's Miguel Power flew the Bermuda flag to an exciting 16th. place overall out of a fleet of 85 competitors. Meanwhile in the ILCA' 4's Sean Pedro fought his way to an impressive 23rd. place.

In the 225 strong, Optimist Fleet, Thomas McBain demonstrated his steady climb in the rankings, thrilling all with his surge late in the series into 37th overall. This milestone reflects meaningful progress in the development of Bermuda's beach volleyball programme. The athletes are now entering an intensive training cycle, with plans to participate in additional NORCECA events ahead of the Games to ensure continued high-level match experience and preparation.

The internal selection process for these teams will take place locally and will be based on athlete performances at a series of tournaments scheduled for April and May.

### Jesston Thomas' Breakout BMRA Season

At just 14 years old, Jesston Thomas didn't just enter the BMRA this season, he made history for himself. What began on May 18, 2024 as his very first-time racing motorcycles quickly turned into an unforgettable championship run.

For Jesston, the season was full of firsts: first races, first battles, first pressures and ultimately, his first championship title. *"It was my first time ever racing motorcycles, and I won the championship,"* he said. *"That's something I'll never forget."*

Winning didn't come easy. Jesston describes his toughest opponent as himself. Learning to trust his instincts, push past fear, and stay mentally strong became just as important as speed on the track. *"I made things harder for myself than they needed to be,"* he explained. *"I had to be more forceful and believe in myself."*

Over the course of the season, Jesston grew both physically and mentally. Beyond getting stronger, he learned patience, emotional control, and resilience—skills that carried over from the racetrack into everyday life. That growth showed in his riding, especially when the pressure was highest.

Behind every successful racer is a strong support system, and Jesston is quick to recognize his. He credits his sponsors Self Made Maintenance, Thyme Restaurant, Roc Art Grafix, and Social Cycles, along with the unwavering support of his parents. *"This season wouldn't have been possible without them,"* he said.

Looking back, Jesston is most proud of his resilience. No matter the challenges, he stayed focused all the way to the end. And when asked what advice he'd give younger riders who want to follow in his footsteps, his answer is simple and confident:

*"Go fast or go home."*

As he looks ahead to next season, Jesston is already focused on improving—becoming stronger, racing with less fear, and continuing to sharpen both his body and mind. If his first season is any indication, this championship is only the beginning.

*"An incredibly unpredictable, title-fighting season."*



### Carter Burgess' Championship Season with BMRA

Carter Burgess proved that heart, hard work, and listening to good coaching can take a rider a very long way. **Carter entered the season ready to learn and he did, finishing the year as the BMRA Junior Division Champion.**

One of the defining moments of Carter's season came when he lined up in a combined Juniors and Experts mini moto race. Competing against older and more experienced riders, Carter crossed the line in third place, beating one of the experts and nearly winning the race. It was a standout performance that showed just how quickly he was closing the gap.

Like many racers, Carter faced challenges early on. A crash during one of his first races shook his confidence and made overtaking feel scary for a while. Instead of letting fear stop him, Carter found inspiration by watching MotoGP riders crash—and then get right back on the bike. Seeing even the best riders fall and recover helped him understand that crashing is part of racing and part of learning. That mindset shift paid off. Over the course of the season, Carter's improvement was clear and measurable. Early on, expert riders would overlap him after just a few laps. As the season progressed, that gap shrank, four laps became seven, and eventually, he wasn't being overlapped at all. It was proof of steady progress, growing confidence, and real development on the bike.

Beyond speed, the season taught Carter important lessons on and off the track. On the track, he learned to push his limits and test himself more. Off the track, he learned that it's okay to try new things without fear you might discover you're really good at them. Carter credits much of his success to his support system, especially Coach Burgess, who pushed him to keep trying, improve his turns, and find more speed every race. That consistent guidance helped Carter build the skills and confidence needed to compete at a championship level.

When asked what he's most proud of, Carter's answer is simple and powerful: becoming the **BMRA Junior Division Champion**. His advice to younger riders hoping to follow the same path is to listen to the coaches and practice turning over and over. Looking ahead to next season, Carter is focused on sharpening his cornering, getting through turns faster, and braking later into corners. With his dedication and love for learning, his future on the track is bright.

Carter sums up his championship season best in his own words:

*"It was an amazing season where I learned, improved every race, and became a champion by working hard and listening to my coaches."*

### **Bermuda Rugby Union continues Schools Outreach Programme as Middle School Students take to the field**

Bermuda Rugby proudly welcomed more than 140+ middle school students from across the island this month for a dynamic and inclusive rugby coaching session at the National Sports Centre. The event marks another milestone in the BRFU's schools development pathway and growing grassroots engagement.

Students from Francis Patton Primary School, Warwick Academy, Saltus Grammar School and Somersfield Academy took part in the session on Tuesday, 13 January, as part of the BRU's Pitch-Up and Play programme, led by Rugby Operations Director Jason Hendrie.

"This initiative is about making rugby accessible to all students, not just those who have played before," Hendrie said. "We are encouraging schools to bring as many participants as possible, so the focus is on exposure, enjoyment and broad involvement."

The Pitch-Up and Play format rewards schools for participation: rather than gaining points only for match wins, schools earn one participation point for every student who comes out to take part. For example, Warwick Academy brought 60 children, earning 60 participation points in the schools league.

Hendrie also delivered a session for high school learners on Monday, with around 25 older students taking part. Combined with this week's middle school turnout, the BRFU coaching team has now worked with hundreds of young rugby hopefuls since October when Hendrie assumed his role.

"We had about 25 high school students on Monday, and on Tuesday we had 140 from four different schools," Hendrie explained. "We're hoping that more schools will buy into the programme as it develops."

The programme's theme for January is 'Inspire', with February focusing on core skill development—including passing, movement and safe contact fundamentals—and March moving into competitive play, where schools will earn points for match results.

Hendrie was keen to emphasize that rugby can be welcoming and fun at first exposure, dispelling misconceptions that the sport is all about physical contact. "We've been showcasing fun passing and movement games, similar to netball, that help build confidence and transferable athletic skills," he said.

He also highlighted Bermuda's emerging youth talent, including a 13-year-old standout player who impressed coaches so much she was invited to the Bermudianas Rugby Academy camp at Warwick Academy in December.

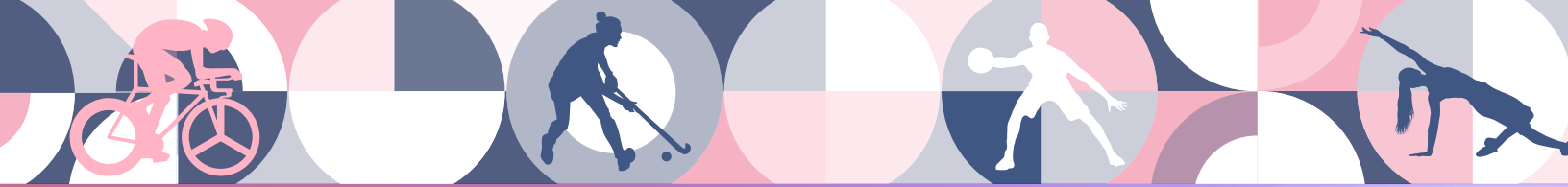
"There is a tremendous amount of natural ability in our schools," Hendrie added. "Our goal is to build clear pathways so young Bermudians can progress—whether they choose to continue playing socially, develop into competitive school and club rugby, pursue overseas opportunities, or represent Bermuda at national level."



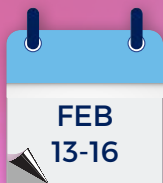
